We still have plenty to accomplish in the last two weeks and we appreciate your efforts in keeping the children focused and engaged coming into school.


Every moment of teaching counts, even the last two weeks and although there will be excitement and fun as we build to the end of term, we are still focused on the children's learning, right up to the very last day.











Social Media

Social Media use outside of school

We have a few concerns regarding children's use of social media outside of school during evenings and weekends.

Most Social media apps are for pupils 13 years and over.

If you do allow your child to access social media, we ask for your vigilance. Just like their interactions in person, online interactions require supervision and support.

What is right will vary from family to family but some strategies that are known to be successful include:

- Monitoring their phones for the apps that are downloaded
- Enacting parental controls on phones and consoles
- Reviewing the messages they send on platforms and apps making monitoring part of a
 - daily or weekly routine
- Setting expectations about what space (preferably communal) and times they have access
 - to devices
- Encouraging them to share or discuss with you what they are doing.

Whilst we appreciate the benefits (and prevalence) of these forms of communication, many of our pupils are struggling when any problems or conflict arise as a result of what is being shared.

We are asking for your partnership in dealing with this, as this is happening outside of school.

As a school we are responding to this with additional teaching during Computing lessons, in 1:1 conversations and teaching opportunities as they arise.







What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

TIKTOK

13+

TikTok is a free social media platform that lets users create, share and watch short videos ranging anywhere from 15 seconds to 10 minutes in duration. The app gained notoriety for its viral dances, trends and celebrity cameos and can be a creative, fun platform for teens to enjoy. Now available in 75 languages, it has more than a billion active users worldwide (as of spring 2022) and is most popular with the under-16 age bracket. In fact, a 2022 Ofcom report found TikTok to be the most-used social media platform for posting content, particularly among young people aged 12 to 17.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

While TikTok's "Following" feed only displays videos from users someone follows, "For You" is a stream of clips based on their previously watched content. Due to TikTok's immense popularity, some young people hove unfortunately been influenced by videos challenging them to perform harmful, criminal or even deadly acts. One extreme example was the 'blockout' trend, which encouraged users to hold their breath until they passed out from a lack of oxygen, it led to two families filing lawsuits against TikTok over the tragic deaths of their children.

CONTACT WITH STRANGERS

With around 1.1 billion users globally, the potential for contact from strangers on TRTok is high — especially as accounts created by over-18 (or youngsters using a false date of birth) are set to public by default. This not only means that someone's profile is visible to everyone else on the app: It also that their videos be suggested to others and enables anyone to comment on them or download them.

IN-APP SPENDING

TikTok is free, but users have the option to buy TikTok coins, which can be used to purchase emplis in the app. These emolis are then sent as rewards (retaining their monetary value) to other users for videos they've created. Coin bundles range from £9.99 to an eye-watering £99; TikTok's policy is that they can't be bought by under-18s, but it's possible to bypass

ADDICTIVE NATURE

TikTok can be addictive, especially for young people; compulsive repeated use can interfere with sleep patterns and be a distraction from other activities. The platform recently introduced default usage time limits of 60 and 100 minutes for new members under 18 (in the UK, children with TikTok average 102 minutes per day on the app), but these restrictions can easily be removed in the settings.

TIKTOK NOW

ntroduced in late 2022, the TikTok vow feature lets users post a sally video or photo at the exact same time as their friends. Users receive a ynchronised notification at a random time of day, giving them three minutes to ack a video or real-time photo. This addition can not only be a distraction to young people but could lead to them nadvertently sharing private content such as their focation.

Advice for Parents & Carers

ENABLE FAMILY PAIRING

Family Pairing allows parents to link their thick account with their child's and control their settings remotely. Parents can then, for example, turn on Restricted Mode (reducing the chances of a child seeing inappropriate content); set screen time limits; and manage their child's ability to send messages (and to whom). Children can't alter these settings without parental approval.

MAKE ACCOUNTS PRIVATE

Although under-16s will have their TikTok account set to private by default, bypassing this sotting is relatively easy. However, parents have the ability to manually set their child's account to private – meaning that their videos won't be visible to strangers and they won't be able to exchange messages with people who aren't on their friends list.

LIMIT IN-APP SPENDING

If your child is using an iPhone or Android device to access TikTok, you can after the settings to prevent them from making in-app purchases. We'd recommend that you enable this feature, as it's quite easy for a young person—without realising what they're doing—to spend a significant amount of real money buying TikTok coins so they can unlock more features of the app.

DISCUSS THE DANGERS

If your child wants to use TikTok and you're happy for them to do so, it's crucial to talk about the potential risks in this type of app. For example, ensure they understand not to share any identifying personal information — and that they realise they could be exposed to inappropriate content. Thinking critically about what they see on tikTok can help children become generally more social media savvy.

READ THE SIGNS

If you're concerned that your child might be spending too much time on TikTok, or that they've been emotionally affected by something inappropriate or upsetting that they've seen, it's important to know how to spot the possible signs. increased irritability and a lack of concentration are potential red flags, as are failing to complete homework or regularly not eating meals.
