Pencils do not contain "lead" but instead con- tain graphite and a clay binder. Drawing pencils range in "hardness" or "softness/blackness" from 9H to 9B. 9H is the hardest pencil – meaning it makes a hard, light mark. 9B is the blackest (or softest) pencil – giving a dense, easily produced mark. F is the grading given to a pencil mid- way between H and B. The way a pencil is held, how sharp it is and how hard you press will affect the marks made.	Willow charcoal comes in different sizes. A sharp line can be creat- ed by using the end of a stick whereas the side of the stick can be used for mid- tones. Pressing harder gives a denser mark. Charcoal can be blended with a finger or erased with a rubber. It needs fixing with hairspray.	Oil pastels are made from pigment mixed with a non-drying oil and wax binder. They generally pro- vide more vivid col- our than soft pas- tels, especially when pressure is applied. Oil pastels can be used alone and work best when used on a large scale.	Chalk pastels make softer marks than oil pastels and are eas- ier to blend. They work especially well on thicker, more textured paper, es- pecially if it has a slight hue (for exam- ple buff coloured) and can be used to draw both high and low lights.	Handwriting pens create precise, fluid lines. Little pressure is needed to pro- duce a mark, and this means that the pen nibs "scoots" easily across the paper.
